


Kim Looks for Frogs

This frog hid in the pond. It looks like the green stuff in the pond.




This frog hid on the grass. It looks like the grass.

The frog jumps up on the green plant. What happens to the frog? It will look like the plant.




Kim tells about frogs. Frogs can become the colors of things next to them.


## Frog Facts

- · Poisonous frogs have bright colors.
- Mimicry: Some frogs that are not poisonous may have bright colors, too.
  It is a way of confusing predators.
- Camouflage: Most frogs can change their colors to match their surroundings.
- Having different colors helps frogs hide from predators who would eat them.
